# Local Flora - BOT 3151C (3 credits) - Spring 2021 Meeting times: Fridays Periods 3 - 6 (9:35 AM - 1:40 PM)

## Description:

Local flora is a fun, field intensive course in which you'll be introduced to local Florida plant communities and ecosystems and learn to identify the plants within them. The course has no official academic prerequisites, so students may come to the class having had no previous botany background. Local flora requires students to master some basic botanical concepts in order to do well. If you are a beginner, don't worry! All the botany you need to know will be taught as we go along. If you are more advanced, you will still find the course challenging. We make every effort to make the course valuable to everyone.

## Learning outcomes: by the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1) Identify ~70 species of local plants using morphological and habitat clues.
- 2) Develop a systematic approach to identifying an unknown plant using knowledge about plant diversity, habitat, and vegetative morphology.
- 3) Discuss and describe connections between plant species and the local ecosystems in which they are found.

#### Description of the components of your grade:

1) Field trip quizzes. These quizzes test your knowledge of the plant species we've learned on field trips. For each quiz, you will be asked to find examples of 20 of these species we've learned. Quizzes will be given at a field site. We'll assign teams of 2 to venture off to work together, and each team of two will be randomly assigned 20 species to find together. Each student will hand in thier own set of 20 specimens assigned and will be given an individual grade. Students will not be permitted to use notes or electronic devices to complete the quiz.

Each field trip quiz is cumulative. Only Latin binomial plant names will be accepted: Correct genus name = 2 pts. Correct species (genus name plus specific epithet) = 3pts. No credit will be given for common names.

- 2) Canvas quizzes. These quizzes will require students to identify species of plants from photographs. Each quiz will include all species from the field trip immediately preceding the asynchronous Canvas quiz.

  Only Latin binomial plant names will be accepted. The correct species (genus name plus specific epithet) name must be given for full credit. No credit will be given for common names.
- **3) Plant communities quiz.** At each field trip, we will discuss characteristics of the communities we encounter. We expect students to record notes about these community types. The plant communities quiz will focus on applying what you've learned about plant species and the community types in which they are found.
- **4) Site brochure.** This assignment will give students the opportunity to creatively apply what they learned throughout the semester about plant communities and the species in them. Students will create an attractive, informative park sign or brochure that could be used at one of the sites we visit, describing a particular plant community and highlighting a key species within it.

#### Field trips:

We will take four-five field trips to visit several different types of plant communities. We will study the local plant life right in the places where the plants grow, and you will learn basic techniques of field botany. On these field trips, you'll collect and learn to identify the plants upon which you'll be quizzed and observe the characteristics of their communities. You'll have a lot of fun seeing other creatures, too.

Bring to the field trips: clippers, bags for collecting plants, clipboard or notebook, water to drink, and snacks/lunch. (Cameras can be very helpful, too.)

Dress appropriately. Wear long pants and old shoes. Sandals are not recommended. Be prepared for normal Florida conditions (i.e. heat, sun, mosquitoes, poison ivy, rattlesnakes, ticks, rain, alligators, etc.) and expect sometimes to get your feet wet. Field trips will not be cancelled due to weather.

Specimen collection – On our field trips, each student will be encouraged to collect a small specimen of each plant species we cover for the course. You will be shown how to press and dry your specimens so that they will remain in good condition for the duration of the semester. These specimens will be your most important study aid. You should bring clippers or scissors and a bag for specimens (a plastic grocery bag will do) with you on every field trip. Masking tape for labeling plant specimens may also be useful.

#### Make up policy:

Due to the unique constraints of a field course, field trips and field trip quizzes **CANNOT** be made up, but alternative arrangements to earn course credit can be arranged in instances of legitimately documented excused absences. Canvas quizzes can be made up in instances of legitimately documented excused absences.
