Course Description

This course focuses on experiential learning through guided action. Students will examine the relationship between humans and the environment in Madagascar by comparing and contrasting the ecological, geographic, social, economic, political, and historical factors influencing the island's natural resource management. Through their travels around the country, students will be exposed to Madagascar's diverse and unique peoples, cultures, ecosystems, and wildlife; will be introduced to several constituencies affecting conservation and sustainable development in Madagascar; and will improve their conceptual and practical skills to critically examine and assess these conservation efforts and the various ethical dimensions of sustainable development practices.

Course Goals and Objectives

- Increased knowledge and appreciation of the unique animals, plants, and environments of Madagascar
- Increased knowledge and appreciation of the culture, geography, and people of Madagascar
- Enhanced understanding of conservation management strategies and the value of biodiversity
- Development of new or improved field skills
- Increased intercultural awareness and sensitivity
- Increased global awareness and intercultural competence

Textbook and Class Readings

Participation:

All students are expected to actively participate in all aspects of this course and program. Since this course does not rely on exams or many lectures, its success is dependent upon the students taking part in organized activities and contributing to assignments, presentations, and discussions.

Prior to departure, we will have four on-campus group orientations to discuss both academic aspects (e.g., the people, cultures, wildlife, geography, and environments of Madagascar) and more practical issues (e.g., vaccinations, food and water, health, individual safety, travel, money, customs, and behavior). Each pre-departure orientation will be 50 minutes and will likely be held in room C2-41A inside of the Health Science Center Library.

Field Journal:

All students will document and write a summary of what they learn each day for the duration of the program. These daily entries should combine the new experiences and information for the day (e.g., as gained through a hike and through their guides) with their own personal observations and experiences. Field journals are due upon return from Madagascar.

Final Report:

Students will select a topic and then present their report to the two co-instructors 7 to 10 days after the in-country part of the course ends. Sample topics may include such items as: the relationship between Malagasy people, their culture, and the environment; effects of recent political and economic turmoil on the environment; the impact of community-based natural resource management; geographical issues affecting the environment; protection of endangered species; or the effects of exportation and demand for Madagascar's natural resources. Students should inform their reports with information from guest lectures and field work in Madagascar, and will be encouraged to include their own opinions and reflections from their field journals.

Additional Comments on Grading:

Your instructors truly want your visit to Madagascar to be special, unforgettable, transformative, and enjoyable. However, for this to happen, you will need to prepare for each daily activity, participate in all activities, collaborate with the other course participants and with the local experts (e.g., guides and researchers), and keep up with your assignments (e.g., pre-departure readings).

Attendance at all specified (i.e., in-class and in-field) activities is mandatory. Absences will only be excused because of illness or personal emergency. Unexcused absences will be penalized by a 5% deduction from your grade. Late work will be penalized 5 points each day.

Your participation, field journal, and report will be evaluated in terms of how thoroughly you treat the current topic; whether your ideas and points are well-thought out, organized, and developed; and whether you make good connections (i.e., real insights) between the material and your personal experiences and opinions.
