Course content. This course will examine the diversity of fishes with an emphasis on FL and be taught by Larry Page, curator of fishes at Florida Museum of Natural History (FLMNH); Rob Robins, collection manager of fishes, FLMNH; and Zach Randall, Manager, Digital Imaging Division, FLMNH.

In addition to identification, classification, biogeography, and phylogenetic relationships of fishes, the course will emphasize morphological, behavioral, and ecological adaptations of fishes living in different environments, natural history collections management, and digitization of specimens and associated data.

Format. Lectures and labs in the Special Collections Building (#640), optional field trips, an individual or group research project.

<u>Lectures and labs</u>: TuTh, 6th-7th hour, 12:50-2:45 Wet Collections Building Room 120 (3207 Hull Road)

<u>Research assignment</u>: an individual or group research project will be completed during the semester. Topics will be identified during the first 2 weeks of class. A written report and oral presentation on the research are due the last week of class.

<u>Optional field trips</u> will include visits to marine, estuarine, and freshwater habitats to explore the breadth of habitats and diversity of fishes in Florida. Overnight trips may be possible.

Exams and grades. A mid-term (100 pts) and a final exam (150 pts) will be given on the material covered in lectures, and a mid-term (100 pts) and a final exam (150 pts) will be given on the material covered in labs. Final exams cover material for the entire semester. The research paper (50 pts) and presentation (50 pts) are due the last week of class.
